These instructions give you guidelines for preparing papers for 13th ESAFS. A concise and factual abstract is required. Use this document as a template if you are using Microsoft Word 2003 or later. Otherwise, use this document as an instruction set. Do not cite references in the abstract. Statistical jargon should be avoided and NO citations should be included in abstract.

Introduction

This document is a template for Microsoft Word versions 2003 or later. The text should be in single-column format. Keep the layout of the text as simple as possible. Most formatting codes will be removed and replaced on processing the article.

Papers should not exceed 3500 words (8 to 15 pages), including the abstract and reference list.

The template is used to format your paper and style the text. All margins, column widths, line spaces, and text fonts are prescribed; please do not alter them. You may note peculiarities. For example, the head margin in this template measures proportionately more than is customary. This measurement and others are deliberate, using specifications that anticipate your paper as one part of the entire proceedings, and not as an independent document.

Please write your text in good English (American or British usage is accepted, but not a mixture of these). Authors who feel their English language manuscript may require editing to eliminate possible grammatical or spelling errors may ask help from colleagues or friends whose native language is English.

It is noticed that title of each section is for reference only. However, basic sections are advised to be kept, such as "Introduction", "Material and Methods" and "Discussion" and so on.

Be sure to outline the organization of your paper, providing a brief synopsis of each section. Do not use subsections in the introduction.

The equations are an exception to the prescribed specifications of this template. You will need to determine whether or not your equation should be typed using either the Times New Roman or the Symbol font (please no other font).

The word "Equation" should be capitalized and spelled out at the beginning of a sentence:

"Equation [3] shows that..."

Otherwise, it should be capitalized and abbreviated:

"Following from Eq. [3], the various..."

Figures and Tables

Figure captions should be below the figures; table captions should appear above the tables. Insert figures and tables after they are cited in the text.

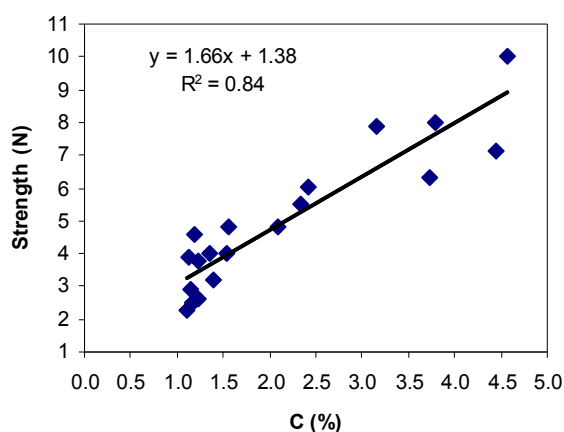


Figure 1. Figure legend. It is good practice to explain the significance of the figure in the text.

Acknowledgments of people, grants, funds, etc. should be placed in a separate section before the reference list. For example:

Reference

Irrelevant references are not recommended. The reference format of this template was similar to the requirement of Springer. The list of references should only include works that are cited in the text and that have been published or accepted for publication. Personal communications and unpublished works should only be mentioned in the text. Do not use footnotes or endnotes as a substitute for a reference list. Reference list entries should be alphabetized by the last names of the first author of each work. There are some examples of different types of reference:
